#### Prisons Counselling and Aftercare Program

This program focuses on the following activities:

#### While in Prison

- Provide rehabilitative counselling to inmates.
- Address the needs of the inmates.

#### **Post Release**

- Assist in finding meaningful employment/accommodation etc.
- Follow up counselling.
- Collaboration with aftercare associations like THE ASHRAM.

Counsellors meet inmates on a weekly / fortnightly basis.

About 77% attend Counseling; 23% do not attend

#### Client Home Visits & Support Program

#### New Cases Objectives:

- To gather information
- To determine needs of recipients
- Due diligence



#### Periodic Review of Cases Objectives:

- Active participation of MC and enhancement of programs
- Gathering Information for periodic reviews
- Educating clients on where to seek assistance

#### **Seasonal Visits**

- To provide any other support recipients may need
- To make them feel special





#### **Birthday Visits to Clients' Home**

- Program started in Nov'12
- Volunteers from Katong Gurdwara visit 2 to 3 families per month on weekends (depending on number of birthdays)
- Goodies and Birthday cake are given during the visit
- Each visit last about 15 to 30 minutes and a feedback report is submitted to SIWEC
- 14 families have been visited as at June 2013 and they were very appreciative.



#### **Institutional Home Visits & Support Program**

#### **Children:**

#### Chen Su Lan Home

- 4 children currently in the home being assisted by SIWEC
- SIWEC has arranged for a Punjabi tutor to assist them in their Punjabi Language
- SIWEC Secretariat staff keep in constant contact with the children/social workers to tend to the socio-emotional needs of the children.

#### Ramakrishna Mission Home

- There are currently 5 boys in the home
- The Sikh Sewaks includes these children in the Bahadur Bachey programme and also bring them to Gurdwaras on a regular basis
- SIWEC also facilitated the contribution of foodstuff from KDS for the missions food fair (a fund raising event).
- The staff and children of the home were very appreciative of this desture



#### **Institutional Home Visits & Support Program**

#### **Elderly**

- SIWEC arranges visits to the elderly staying in Homes throughout
   Singapore. At the moment there are three homes that are known to us.
- We are in constant contact with the Social Workers at the homes to ensure that the socio-emotional needs of the residents there are taken of.
- The Challenges that the residents face are primarily
  - ✓ They have problems in communicating with the staff
  - ✓ Loneliness

# NEW PROGRAMS INTRODUCED IN 2012 / 2013



#### **YUVA Youth Mentoring Program**

#### **Program Context**

This cross-age mentoring program is brought together with a common belief that some children in the community lacked meaningful academic and social guidance.

#### **Mission Statement**

The mission of YUVA Youth Mentoring Program is to empower children/youth in our community to make positive life choices that enable them to maximize their personal potential

#### **Primary goal**

- Empathy, friendship and attention
- To establish a caring relationship with him or her in a clearly and consistently structured context

9 youths have successfully completed the 4 full day training course and passed the competency-based assessment in 2012

Mentoring process started in July 2012.

7 mentees and 11 mentors as at June 2013.



#### Ashram – A Halfway House

Since 1999, the Ashram has been assisting substance abusers and penal offenders undergo rehabilitation and facilitate their reintegration into society.

SIWEC sends a **volunteer counselor** to Ashram once a week. An **IT trainer** has also been sent to teach clients basic computer skills.

Yishun Gurdwara is **providing langgar** once a week. Residence were appreciative of this service.







#### **Fostering Scheme**

The Ministry of Social and Family Development (MSF) administers the Fostering Scheme for children below the age of 18 years.

The foster families provide shelter, stability and love to children who are in need as their parents are unable to look after them (e.g. abandoned, neglected or ill-treated).

SIWEC works with MSF by facilitating arrangement for foster parents from the community.

MSF Staff joined us during the Nam Ras Event to promote fostering scheme to our community.

SIWEC has linked 3 foster children with families.



#### **Fund Raising Events**

#### Objectives of fund raising activities are 2 fold:

- To build a solid financial foundation so that SIWEC is able to maintain its welfare programs and cater for more recipients or programs.
- To build a sustainable GIRO based income so that monthly welfare and operational expenses are met.

## Coordination & Communication with other Welfare Institutions

- SIWEC Periodically visits VWOS such as SINDA, AWWA, etc & Institutions such as Ramakrishna Mission, Cheng Su Lan Home to inform them of our programs and also to build a good rapport.
- Through such visits, we acquire added information from the ground that
  may have gone unnoticed. For example, in a recent meeting with SINDA,
  we learnt that there were a few children who had not enrolled for their
  Primary one registration. We have since rectified the situation with SINDA
  and MOE (the children have migrated).
